Our children made new friends, sang, and moved to the music with residents of The Elms, led by IMM (Intergenerational Music Making). We will continue to visit in the weeks between half term and the Easter break.



## Chess Club Tournament

Today, we held the GRAND FINALS of the Heber Chess Club 1 Spring 2026 tournament, which was run in two groups: year 6, and years 3-5. Everyone competed with enthusiasm and displayed great sportsmanship. The year 6 final was between Albert and Julian. Julian captured Albert's queen early on, but Albert did not give up and fought back valiantly. It was a long battle...but a lost queen is a difficult position to recover from and in the end, Julian was the winner! The years 3-5 final was between Lenny (year 4) and Max (year 5). 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## Safer Internet Day 2026

On Tuesday 10th February, Heber took part in Safer Internet Day, a global event celebrated each year to promote the safe and positive use of technology for children and young people.

This year's theme was "Smart Tech, Safe Choices: Exploring the safe and responsible use of AI."

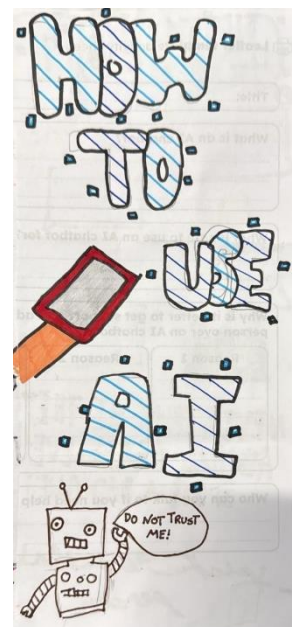
All classes from Nursery to Year 6 joined in with a range of activities designed to help children think carefully about how technology, including artificial intelligence, is used in everyday life. Regardless of age group, there was one question all children were asking themselves: What's the difference between humans and AI?

Our younger pupils explored the idea of voice assistants, such as Amazon Alexa, Apple Siri or Google Assistant. They learned that while these technologies can be helpful and fun, they are not real people. Children from Nursery to Year 2 thought carefully about what humans can do that AI cannot.

In Key Stage 2, pupils took part in thoughtful discussions about artificial intelligence and chatbots, such as ChatGPT, CoPilot and Gemini. They explored questions such as when using AI is helpful, when it might be unfair or unkind, and how to recognise misuse, including sorting various scenarios into 'okay' and 'not okay'. Crucially, classes discussed reasons why it's better to get support and advice from a person over an AI chatbot and produced some brilliant posters and leaflets to help teach others.

Many classes also enjoyed taking part in the BBC Safer Internet Day Live Lesson, which reinforced key online safety messages through an interactive lesson.

Overall, Safer Internet Day was a great success and children once again showed how knowledgeable they are about technology and the internet. We encourage families to continue these important conversations at home. Asking children about the apps, games, and technology they use can make a real difference in helping them develop safe and confident online habits.







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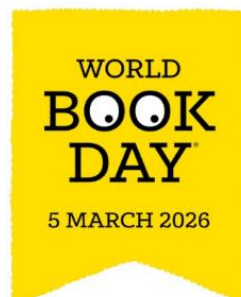
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## World Book Day 2026

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## This week in the Music Hall...

It has been a fantastic half term of music making at Heber. Everyone has worked really hard and I hope they are looking forward to learning their new instruments after Half Term.

Year 1 have been learning the song Noises in the Night. They have been listening to lots of different tuned and untuned percussion instruments and thinking about how they all make different sounds. They have then been deciding which instruments they can use to create the sounds featured in the Noises of the Night and have been playing them while singing.

Year 2 have been learning about dynamics. They learned the words Piano, meaning soft and Forte meaning loud. The children had a go at playing their instruments both Piano and Forte as well as quickly and slowly. Year 2 also played the Glockenspiels this week, which they will be continuing to learn after half term.

Year 3 successfully recorded their Foley sounds. We all worked together to create the sound effects for a short cartoon, Snoopy Making Pizza. This week each child played their own sounds for the video which we recorded in groups. Year 3 parents, keep your eyes peeled for the completed videos which will be ready after half term.

Year 4 gave some beautiful performances of their musical creations based on different famous artworks. This week, they had a go at reversing the process and drawing while listening to music. They listened to two contrasting pieces, Morning Mood and Hall of the Mountain King, both from Peer Gynt by Grieg. They followed the shapes and sounds in the music with their pencils. We then discussed how the pieces looked different on the paper as well as sounding different.

Year 5 completed their canons and rounds module with two lovely performances. First, they sang all four of their partner songs, with really beautiful singing and clear melodies. They then learned to play Frere Jacques on the glockenspiel. Two groups played the famous tune in the round and a third group played the last line Ding Dang Dong as an ostinato to accompany the round.

Year 6 have now covered the Medieval, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical and Romantic eras. This week they learned how the Romantic era is all about emotion and expression. They listened to and had a go at playing some long flowing melodies, like in Chopin's Nocturne in E flat Major. They then listened to pieces from the Romantic era including operas, ballets and symphonies. They created a tableau for each piece, showcasing the story or emotion they felt the music portrayed.

### Volunteer Band Leader Call-out.

Thanks to the success of Heber Bands such as The Ants and The Misty Minds, we have had lots of interest in the school from budding musicians hoping to form new bands. This is great to see, and we want to encourage Heber students to get creative with their own music making. However, we are running out of slots in which bands can rehearse in school time and with help from the teachers. We were wondering if any musically inclined parents/carers and friends of Heber would be interested in facilitating band rehearsals.
